Culver Urges Transfer Of Funds To Aid Farmers

WASHINGTON — Congress-man John C. Culver Thursday urged immediate transfer of funds to the emergency credit revolving funds of the Farmers Home Administration to provide disaster assistance to farmers in Fayette county and to other areas in Iowa which were damaged by last week's tornadoes.
Unless we take immediate steps to provide this assistance, many of these farmers may not be able to plant and harvest a crop this season," Culver told the House of Representatives. "Few farmers can afford to miss an entire crop year and many may be forced out of farming completely unless help is forthcoming."
Culver pointed out that in Fayette county alone at least twenty farm homes and 45 farm build-ings had been seriously damaged by the storm, and preliminary estimates place the loss figures in that one isolated area at one million dollars. He said that total farm losses in Northern Iowa would be at least \$3,750,000.
Farmers cannot hope to recover these losses through ordinary credit means," Culver empha-sized, "and it is exactly for this purpose that the 3%, thirty year loan emergency credit fund was established."
Noting that the legislation would not require any additional expenditures, but only a transfer of already available funds, Cul-ver emphasized the soundness of the investment. "Since it was established nearly 20 years ago, approximately one billion dollars has been loaned from the funds," he stated. "The collection record is 95.9% of maturities, and losses have been less than 2% of the amount loaned."
When the tornadoes struck in Iowa last week, Culver requested immediate consideration of the measure and the leadership of the House of Representatives agreed to schedule the bill this week.


