\$2 Million High School Aired

Iowa Falls Votes Tuesday

IOWA FALLS — Voters in the Iowa Falls School District will decide Tuesday whether or not to build a \$2,164,000 high school and convert the present structure into a fifth and sixth grade attendance center.

Also on the ballot will be a \$250,000 enclosed swimming pool, covering an additional 13,000 square feet. The pool and the building will be two separate questions.

Included in the proposed 115,000 square foot building are a two-story academic section, a triple-purpose student center, a double gymnasium seating 2,400, a 650-capacity auditorium, a vocational education section, music area and physical education rooms. The auditorium could be divided into three separate lecture rooms.

Conversion Not Included
 Cost of converting the present high school into fifth and sixth grade rooms has been estimated by the administration at \$12,000. This would be handled through regular expenditures for repairs and remodeling, and is not included on the ballot.

If approved, the building would have the following effects on property taxes: average quarter-section farm, high school, \$88.97, pool, \$10.27.

If approved, the high school building would mean additional property taxes of \$88.97 on a quarter-section farm; the pool would add another \$10.27. Taxes on a home in town valued at \$10,000 would be increased \$18.48 and \$2.13. For a home valued at \$15,000, it would mean \$27.72 and \$3.20, and for a \$20,000 home, \$36.96 and 4.27.

May 'Freeze'
 Taxation figures were prepared on the basis of last year's valuations. Exact figures will depend on the millage allotments. Persons over 65 who have an annual taxable income of 3,500 or less may apply through the assessor's office to have their taxes "frozen" at the last rate.

In order to pass, the bond issue must receive 60 per cent approval from those voting. If the approval is given, bonds would be sold later in the summer and a call for bids would be issued. Following the letting of contracts, construction would start in the spring of 1969, with the building scheduled for completion by September, 1970.

Extensive Study
 The high school proposal was developed after extensive studies by the school board and citizen committees. An original plan to remodel the high school and build elementary additions and a new elementary building was discarded because the board and citizens felt it would not adequately solve the elementary and high school problems.

With a new high school, and the fifth and sixth grade center, there would be 21 new elementary rooms, as compared to 14 in the remodeling plan. Besides providing addition high school classrooms, the new building would provide more area for specialized vocational areas. An auditorium was not included in the remodeling plan, either.

Voting will take place only in the City Hall from noon Tuesday until 7 p.m. Voter qualifications are the same for other elections: six months residence in the state, 60 days in the county, and 10 in the district.

S. Tama Grants Diplomas To Two Accident Victims

TAMA — Two accident victims have been approved for diplomas from South Tama High School.

The school will graduate 181 seniors on completion of the current semester requirements Tuesday evening.

Donald Bachman, school principal, recommended that the diploma of Kristine Ann Nolting, who was killed in an auto accident last week, be awarded posthumously and presented to her father, Roland Nolting, at some time other than commencement night. Kristine's mother also lost her life in the accident.

Bachman also recommended that full credit for completion of high school requirements be given Gary Bazal of Vining, who lost both legs and an arm as the result of an auto accident last year.

Bachman told the board that Gary worked hard to complete his studies while he was at a rehabilitation center in Chicago, Ill., and lacks only four weeks of completing the current semester's work in four subjects. It has been extremely difficult for him to devote time to study, Bachman said, as he has been in Iowa City much of the time recently learning to use his artificial limbs.

A transcript of his grades has been received.

The board approved Bachman's recommendation and Gary will receive his diploma.

Several other seniors not listed may be granted diplomas at the conclusion of summer school or correspondence work after all requirements have been met.

Vinton Hires Teachers, Custodians

Preliminary figures reveal an increase in the budget figures of approximately 3 1/2 mills.
