Diana Worm, 18, a Suicide

East High Cheerleader Kills Herself With Rifle

An East High School cheerleader died at Allen Memorial Hospital late Monday night, eight hours after she shot herself in the forehead with a .22 calibre rifle.

Black Hawk County Medical Examiner Dr. Paul O'Keefe said the death of Diana Lynn

Worm, 18, of 512 Courtland St., had been ruled a suicide.

Survived Eight Hours

O'Keefe said Miss Worm died of a massive cerebral hemorrhage cause by a penetrating gunshot wound to the head.

According to police, Miss Worm had been staying with the William Hope family at 512 Courtland since the suicide of her mother, about a year ago.

Hope reported the shooting at 3:11 p.m. Monday.

A year ago, Miss Worm was one of the finalists in the East High School quiz contest.

Mother Also Suicide

Her mother, Mrs. Vera Pearl Worm, also killed herself. She was 46 when she took her own life with a shotgun at her home, 210 1/2 Courtland St.

Services Thursday

Funeral services for Miss Worm will be conducted Thursday at 1:30 p.m. at First Lutheran Church with the pastor, the Rev. S. M. Scheimweller, officiating, and the Parrott & Wood Funeral Home in charge.

Mr. Miller, who died of cancer at 1:15 p.m. Monday at Lawn City Nursing Home in Cedar Falls, had lived in Waterloo for 35 years. He was born March 1, 1889, at Aredale to Charlie and Anna Miller. His wife preceded him in death.

Friends may view the body at the Johnson Funeral Home from 3 p.m. Wednesday until noon Thursday, when the body will be taken to the church.


MRS. AUDREY STRAYER ROSENTHAL

PROPOSED CAMPUS—The proposed East High campus, a map of which is shown above, will include 48.5 acres of land in its completed stage. The project, under the joint sponsorship of the City, Board of Education and Urban Renewal Board, will take at least four or five years to complete. The proposed plan for the campus is expected to help the orderly growth of the community as well as provide adequate space for educational facilities at East High.

Take Look Ahead In Campus Plans

"In planning the proposed East High Campus, we are beginning to look at the 1970's and the fact that the school district must keep up with the growth of the city with educational institutions," Dr. George Hohl, superintendent of the Waterloo Community Schools, said at a news conference Tuesday.

He said that at the present time there are 19,873 students in Waterloo and that in the next three or four years the student population will be more than 21,000.

Part of Bond Issue

The proposed campus plan will be part of a bond issue which will be presented in the fall. Hohl said that the last bond issue for the school district was in 1962 for \$1,500,000 and that those funds along with the two and one-half mill levy have enabled the school board to build numerous additions and buildings.

"The objectives of the board in 1962 have been met and even exceeded. The funds available from that bond issue have been stretched to the limit," he said.

To Improve Stadium

Dr. Hohl said that another part of the proposed bond issue will include improvements on Sloane alee stadium.

He said that East High School is now located on less than nine acres of land and that the minimum for a high school is considered 40 acres. The proposed campus would provide 37 additional acres of land for the school.

Renewal Board Link

The Urban Renewal Board has been designated as the coordinator to work out with the Board of Education and the City of Waterloo the plans for the proposed campus. George Griebonow, director of the Urban Renewal Board, said that the Waterloo area is in a period of unprecedented growth and industrial ex-

Nixon Presidential Favorite for Youths

Peter Taurins, GOP Nationalities Division. Taurins is a native Latvian who served in a prison camp during World War II.

In a straw vote taken during the afternoon's convention, Richard Nixon received 33 votes over his closest contender, Ronald Reagan with 17. Reagan rated high as a vice presidential candidate, however, receiving 35 votes over Charles Percy with 17.

Johnson for Governor

Candidate for governor of Iowa, Donald Johnson won overwhelmingly by 60 votes over his closest opponent, Robert Ray with 7. James Brown well gained 38 votes as candidate for U.S. senator over David Stanley with 31, for the closest race of the afternoon.

City Inspector Explains

City's Building Permit Fees Equal to County's

An apparent difference in the permits charged for building by the city of Waterloo and the county was clarified by Hubert Kuehl, Waterloo building inspector, Tuesday.

Kuehl gave the explanation in response to a complaint by builder Robert Edgerton at the board of supervisors meeting Monday that he paid less for a permit on a comparable house in the city than one he is building in the country.

Other Fees Payable

The Waterloo inspector said Edgerton apparently overlooked the fact that the fee shown on his permit is for the structure only and that other permit fees have to be paid by contractors who install plumbing, heating and wiring.

Air Conditioning

He said that by the time permit fees of the other divisions are added to that charged by the building inspector's department the city permit would cost at least as much as that charged by the county.

Kuehl noted that a permit fee for installation of air conditioning is another separate city charge on new construction, usually done by the heating contractor.

When you wrap this all up

it is as high as the county's fees," Kuehl stated.

Car Safety Checks Show

509 Flaws

The Waterloo Police Department checked 1,754 cars between May 13-19 in a safety check and noted 509 violations, according to information from Capt. John L. Boots, head of the traffic department.

The most frequent violation noted was the license plate light out, followed by turn signals, head lights, tail lights and stop lights in that order.

Capt. Boots noted that 58

drivers did not have licenses with them, or had no driver license or had an expired license. The whole police department participated in the safety check.
