A strong late winter storm system developed over the Rockies and strengthened as it moved across the Mississippi Valley. Initially, as warm air surged north ahead of the storm system, the precipitation fell in the form of rain. However, as the storm system moved east of the region, brisk northwest winds ushered in much colder air, allowing the rain to change over to snow. Most of the area received between 1 and 4 inches of snow.
