


- **Damaging winds and isolated tornadoes possible through this evening, beginning in SE AL/western FL panhandle later this morning/early this afternoon.**

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### Overview:



Forecasts have delayed timing a bit (as compared to yesterday) with approaching cold front and ensuing severe thunderstorm threat into our area. However, a tornado watch will remain in effect through at least 2 pm CST (3 pm EST) for portions of southwest GA, the western FL panhandle and all of southeast AL (see attachment). This watch is certainly warranted as nose of humid air off of the Gulf of Mexico advances inland ahead of approaching cold front. Storms in AL (and overnight in MS) have been persistent and shown intermittent rotation with a few tornadoes overnight. As further heating occurs, expect the potential for a few tornadoes and some wind damage to increase with small supercells both ahead of and along the main cold front. Southeastern AL and the far western FL panhandle will obviously be the first to experience any threat, with the threat advancing steadily eastward into the late afternoon. Even areas within the eastern parts of the current tornado watch may not see much action until the mid afternoon. Depending on the evolution of thunderstorms and how much heating can occur within broken low cloud deck across the region, additional watches and warnings may be required through the evening eastward over more of our area. The threat for isolated severe thunderstorms and tornadoes should spread into more of GA and northern FL through 8-10p before gradually diminishing overnight.





**Tornado Watch # 758 - Valid from 745 AM until 200 PM CST**

## Weather Briefing for Emergency Managers for November 30, 2010

### Summary:

\*\* Tornado watch number 758 in effect through 2 pm CST/3 pm EST for part of the area.

\*\* Showers and a few severe thunderstorms are expected to continuing developing and advancing across the Tri-State area well into the evening.

\*\* The primary threats from these severe storms will be isolated tornadoes and damaging winds.

\*\* Cold front will end the severe threat from west to east through the evening, with threat ending later tonight over central GA and northern FL.
